

On Tuesday, Dec. 3rd a group of twelve Honors students representing a range of years and majors took part in a dialogue at City Hall with Rochester Mayor Malik Evans. The discussion was centered on Mayor Evans' approach to *Leadership in the 21st Century*, with students asking questions about supports for refugee communities in Rochester, transportation priorities for the region, K-12 education and equitable access to college, economic development and entrepreneurship. Students also asked Mayor Evans about possible challenges our institutions may face in the coming years regarding freedom of the press, stricter immigration policies, and the erosion of social services, and how those national priorities may impact Rochester and similar communities across the US.

Mayor Evans' highlighted his belief in the power of collaboration to effect positive change, and the importance of establishing trust between people and entities as the necessary foundation for partnerships to thrive. When asked how Honors students at RIT could get involved in initiatives of the city, Mayor Evans offered that individuals must find the issue or cause that they are most passionate about and seek out government, non-profit, and community programs that address the topic so students can connect their skills and talents to those endeavors. And if those agencies don't exist, draw on and develop your own leadership experiences to create something new that meets the challenges of the moment and builds bridges of understanding to create a shared, actionable vision that will improve the lives of all citizens.




